STEM Humanities - World History Syllabus

What are the Humanities?

The term defined: The humanities are subjects that study the human condition. The word comes from the Latin humanus, which can mean pertaining to man, humane, cultured, or refined. The humanities are the stories, the ideas, and the words that help us make sense of our lives and our world. The humanities introduce us to people we have never met, places we have never visited, and ideas that may have never crossed our minds.

Subjects included: The humanities include ancient and modern languages and linguistics, literature, history, philosophy, religion, law, anthropology and visual and performing arts such as music and theatre. All of these subjects have as their goal the exploration and explanation of human experience.

What is studied: In most disciplines in the humanities, written texts are extremely important, especially in history, philosophy, and literature. These texts can be both primary (first-hand, from the time period accounts) and secondary (written accounts from a second-hand source or after the time period).

What will be taught in STEM Humanities - World History?

This course covers world civilizations, historical themes and global developments ranging from prehistory to present. You will be challenged to use critical and interpretive skills, as well as to examine and analyze historical issues from many perspectives. Some themes covered in the course include social, economic and cultural trends; issues of gender and ethnic identity; interrelationships and exchanges among various civilizations; and the ability to compare different historical eras and societies.

Course Basics

Grading: Your grades in this course will be gained through periodic multiple-choice comprehension quizzes, science in the news reports, primary source analyses, class discussion participation, DBQ essays, and project work toward a final presentation. Each assignment will be given a point value and your grade will be determined by the amount of points attained out of the amount of points possible. All of these assignments will be discussed further at a later time.

Texts: You will be provided an e-textbook called *The Student's Friend: World History and Geography*, as well as excerpts from various primary source manuals. If you have an eBook reader, laptop/desktop or other smart device, you can download it for free. If you need a printed copy, please request one at the beginning of each unit. The files will also be available on it'sLearning. I will supplement the text with numerous primary and secondary sources throughout the course.
